## **QUAD Team Report**

#### Thad Schofield

- Continuing to work with D&L Groceries; final results will be known in next few months
- 2 Facade Grants on Jefferson approved
- Canal St. BOA Update Jane Forbes, City of Rochester Environmental Specialist and Joe Biondolillo
  - Asking for support for 2 projects. Applying for brownfield funding for two areas via US EPA Brownfield Clean-up Program; can be up to \$200,000 (assessment or cleanup).
  - Assessment (25 Canal St. north end of SW Quadrant) .868 acres; part of Carriage Factory (historical, 1900's; made high-end carriages). Petroleum fuel toxins. Soil and groundwater contaminants. High interest because of the other development that is happening in that area.
  - Clean-up (937-941 Genesee St.) automobile property, then dry cleaners; tax delinquent. City providing notice; will be offered at Environmental Auction at City Hall 11/2. City needs to get ownership so that they are eligible for grant funding. Petroleum contaminations. Limited to the property per assessment.
  - IMPORTANT: Asking for a Letters of Support from SWCC and any other community residents. Must show community support for these projects. Appl Deadline is 11/19; draft application will be posted on website by Monday. Will hear around May or June if grant received. Community will then be notified. EPA paperwork will go into the Fall (October 2013). Can start when agreements are finalized.

- No concern about competition with Bullshead BOA; EPA grant is Federal; Bullshead is a State grant
- o Once an area has been identified as a BOA, it's easier to get further grant support.

## Linda Hedden

- Jefferson Ave FIS; what's next? Next Discussion: <u>Monday 6 p.m.</u> at Anthony Square Apts, 70 Cunningham St.
- Owner occupant and investor-owned grants available
- Pedestrian walkway at 431 W. Main is forthcoming; new lighting going up
- Café is well attended; 46 seats

#### Rick Rynski

- Bullshead no word on BOA application; no reason to think we won't get the grant.
- Demolition of 2 buildings on W. Main; problem with bids re-bids needed; 6-wk delay
- Brooks Landing area Flats Project (student housing, restaurant and credit union);
   construction to start late winter, early spring; completion in 2014

### **David Hawkes**

- Genesee Valley Master Plan revamping park area; will need a lot of community input. Suggestion: Indoor rowing facility (excellent tourist attraction); Pittsford has one.
- Completed 6 Neighborhood Uplifts in FIS area
- Revitalization Project coming to an end
- Holiday wreathes are on the way

# **Special Discussion:** Robert Walker-Smith (SWAN) Re Bullshead Project

- Robert asking that Bullshead (the plaza and the area) be revisited. Has had a meeting with Rick Rynski, Joan Roby-Davison, Mayor Richards, and David Hawkes. Robert thanked team for work to date. Per Rick Rynski, two buildings (888 W. Main) should be going down in Jan. Robert proposing that all 4 buildings go down.
- Per DeWain, 19<sup>th</sup> Ward would like to see infill as opposed to full demolition. Cheaper to redevelop. Meeting result was that the buildings should go down; not in good shape; can replace buildings with ones that honor the character of the neighborhood. Robert wants to work with neighbors going forward; proposing to relocate businesses into the plaza. Definitely two schools of thought. Neighborhood United needs to be at the table. Need a larger community meeting before the year ends. Other stakeholders that need to be at a community meeting to discuss Bullshead: all building owners, Unity Health System.
- Muscatella noted that they've had buildings with bricks falling that were able to be repaired and are now an attraction. Dutchtown would like to be included in future discussions.
- Robert noted that based on intersecting streets, volume of traffic, community requests for jobs and places to eat, this area needs a strong signal that economic development will be happening soon.
- Suggesting that Bullshead Plaza be reconfigured; shipping side on Genesee St.
- Need Unity at the table; we will be in very bad shape if Unity leaves.
- Suggestion: Have a kick-off that invites Mayor and Stuart Putnam. Also to be invited: Leenhouts, Spiritus Christi, DePaul, Marvin Maye
